- Genealogy is much more than building out your "pedigree" tree!
 - It is connecting people to their family and history including the context and building the story.
- Create for yourself a free account to use and keep at FamilySearch.org.
 - Any work you do at FamilySearch will be available for free to anyone with a free account.
 - Join Ancestry.com when you are ready for more research check membership options here.
- ◆ Build your tree online at <u>FamilySearch.org</u> or <u>Ancestry.com</u> (\$) or <u>WikiTree.com</u>.
- ◆ Build and/or save your tree on your home computer using <u>Family Tree Maker</u> (\$) or <u>Roots Magic</u> (\$).
- In exploring individuals and relationships, check the unified trees at FamilySearch and WikiTree.
- Usually best to start with yourself and work back verifying and documenting each step.
 - Generally very important to research siblings, other spouses, and often neighbors and associates.
- Evaluate the evidence and cite your sources consider the context and reliability of the sources.
- ♦ Make use of the FamilySearch Wiki, and LDSgenealogy.com and CyndisList.com

Record Types to Explore:

- <u>Vital Records</u> Birth, Marriage, Death (BMD)
 - Contacting a Town or County Clerk can be helpful.
- ♦ U.S. Census Records Enumerator Instructions
- Immigration and Naturalization records
- ◆ Cemetery Records
- Search by title for digitized out-of-copyright books including County histories and much more.
- <u>U.S. Land & Property Records</u> search by county
- <u>U.S. Probate Records</u> and other <u>U.S. Court Records</u>
- U.S. Church Records
- ◆ <u>U.S. Military Records</u> e.g. <u>Fold3.com</u> (\$)
- Newspapers and U.S. City Directories
- Newspapers at the Library of Congress
- Harvest, digest and savor the more prevalent information about recent generations!
- Seek out special-interest websites and FaceBook Groups for a particular area of interest.
- Make use of Google Search features and maps and street view and translate.
